

Mind Matters: #4, The Mind of Christ Philippians 1:27-2:11 October 6, 2019

It's difficult for people to get along, and the main reason why is we are all too <u>self</u>-centered. The solution is for us to develop the mind of Christ.

Christ's mind was full of many healthy thoughts, attitudes, and purposes. The one specifically emphasized in Scripture, however, is his attitude of humility, serving, self-denial, and sacrifice. This led him to forfeit his right of equality with God, and become a human and a servant, and be obedient to God at the cost of being crucified (Philippians 2:5-8).

Because Jesus did this, God <u>exalted</u> him to the highest place, and gave him the supreme name (see also Matthew 28:18; John 13:3; Hebrews 7:26; 1 Peter 3:22; Revelation 5:12). That calls for worshiping him, as we have done this morning.

Christ marked out a pathway of suffering first and then glory. If we follow him, we too will be glorified (Romans 8:17-18; 2 Corinthians 4:17-18; Colossians 3:1-4). But now is the time to serve and sacrifice. The mind of Christ is not merely an noble ideal. We are called to actually "have the same mindset" as him (Philippians 2:5). What does this look like in our relationships?

Backing up in the Philippians, it means not being selfish or conceited but rather humble enough to count others more significant than ourselves and look to their interests and not our own (2:3-4). It means having the same mind, same love, being in full accord and of one mind (2:2). It means standing firm in one spirit, with one mind striving side by side for the faith of the gospel (1:27). When a church has the mind of Christ, their humble self-denial and other-centeredness brings them together as <a href="https://one.nc.no.ne.go.n

The specific phrase "mind of Christ" also appears in 1 Corinthians 2:16. Paul had the mind of Christ but the Corinthians had their minds set on human interests. An overview of 1 Corinthians provides good practical application for what the mind of Christ should look like in a church setting.

Since self-centeredness is what makes it so hard for people to get along, it's not surprising that such a self-indulgent, proud church as Corinth was also so divided. The <u>solution</u> for getting along is to have the <u>mind</u> of Christ among us.
