## Dear Brethren,

Robert Clinton, a professor of Leadership wo spent 15 years researching over 1000 leaders of the Bible stated, "Sadly, only 30 percent of the leaders in the Bible finished well. That means that 70 percent fell short of God's plan for their lives." We all know Christians who were perhaps our mentors, encouragers, leaders and who may have even baptized us into Christ and yet departed from the faith.
